Policy for preparing the Annual Fire Safety Report

In 2020 the Texas A&M University School of Veterinary Medicine & Biomedical Sciences (SVMBS) built facilities on the West Texas A&M University (WTAMU) campus in Canyon, Texas, to initiate the Texas A&M University Veterinary Education, Research, and Outreach Program (VERO). VERO provides SVMBS students the opportunity to complete the first two years of their four year veterinary curriculum (2+2 DVM Program), conduct research, and complete clinical electives at these facilities on the WTAMU campus. For the 2022-2023 academic year, VERO is provided in accordance with an intra-system cooperation contract between the SVMBS and WTAMU, effective August 1, 2020.

Texas A&M University SVMBS students and employees located at facilities used for VERO share a campus and its facilities, including on-campus student housing, with WTAMU. In accordance with the Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Crime Statistics Act (Clery Act), if your institution shares on-campus housing facilities with another Title IV institution, both institutions are considered to be in control of the facilities and must report on those facilities to comply with Clery Act requirements. These Clery Act requirements include keeping a fire log, publishing an annual fire safety report containing fire safety information and fire statistics, and submitting fire statistics to the Department of Education. Disclosure of missing student procedures that pertain to students residing in the on-campus housing facilities is also required and can be found in the VERO Annual Security Report at the following website:

Texas A&M University SVMBS administrators and the Office of Risk, Ethics, and Compliance (OREC) compile the VERO Annual Fire Safety Report with information and input from various sources such as WTAMU Police Department (WTAMU PD) and the WTAMU Office of Fire and Life Safety.

The Annual Fire Safety Report is published every year by October 1st and contains three years of selected fire statistics in accordance with the Higher Education Opportunity Act (HEOA). VERO became a campus for Clery Act purposes in August 2020, therefore, statistics for 2021 and August through December 2020 are disclosed in this 2022 Annual Fire Safety Report. Calendar year 2019 is not available nor required to be disclosed in the 2022 Annual Fire Safety Report. This, the 2022 report, was prepared and updated to reflect a shared campus and shared statistics for 2021 and a portion of calendar year 2020.

Annual Fire Safety Report and Related Information

The Annual Fire Safety Report is required by the HEOA for any Title IV institution that maintains an on-campus student housing facility. Per HEOA, an institution that maintains an on-campus student housing facility must collect fire statistics, publish an Annual Fire Safety Report, and keep a fire log.

The Clery Act was amended by HEOA in 2008, requiring future reports include campus housing fire safety statistics. The information contained in this document relates to fire safety for on-campus student residential housing only. Notifications

Each year, an e-mail notification which provides website access to this report is sent to all current students, faculty, and staff. Prospective employees are notified about the Annual Fire Safety Report through an email distributed when applying for a position. Website access to the Annual Fire Safety Report is provided by the Division of Human Resources and Organizational Effectiveness through a link called “A safe and welcoming environment” located on the Prospective Employees webpage <https://employees.tamu.edu/talent-management/careers/index.html>. The Required Employee Notices & Important Reminders webpage (<https://employees.tamu.edu/employees/required-notices.html>) also links to the Annual Fire Safety Report under the “Safety and Security Notices” heading.

Prospective students are notified of the availability of the Annual Fire Safety Report through an email distributed when applying for admission. Website access to the Annual Security Report is provided

by the Office of Admissions through a link titled “Campus Safety” located at the bottom of the Admissions webpage (<http://admissions.tamu.edu/>).

WTAMU provides a fire log for all reported fires that occur in its on-campus student housing facilities. The fire log with information regarding the most recent 60-day period is open to public inspection and is available at the WTAMU PD office, upon request, during normal business hours at Old Sub 102, Canyon, TX at <https://www.wtamu.edu/university-police/upd-daily-crime-log.html> . Portions of the log older than 60 days can be requested from WTAMU PD and will be available within 2 business days of a request for public inspection. A request can be made by phone at 806-651-2365, or a written request may be sent to WTAMU PD, 2403 Russell Long Blvd., Canyon, TX 79015.

Reporting Fires

Per federal law, Texas A&M University is required to annually disclose statistical data on all fires that occur in on-campus student housing facilities. VERO students, employees, and others reporting a fire on campus should 911 or WTAMU PD at 806-651-2300.

Below are the non-emergency phone numbers to call to report fires that have already been extinguished. These phone numbers are for fires that are no longer a danger and/or may not have already been reported to WTAMU PD. If the fire event concerned a campus residential unit students, employees, or others may also activate a fire alarm pull station, located throughout the residential halls, to begin immediate evacuation of the building and notify WTAMU PD of the fire.

Fire Safety Education and Training Programs

The mission of the Fire and Life Safety at West Texas A&M University is to provide advisory and technical support to the university community by managing risk, assessing and evaluating the environment, promoting safe work practices, providing educational training programs, and ensuring compliance with applicable regulations and standards. Faculty, staff and students should be aware of the location of fire safety equipment and building evacuation routes. For on-campus residents, fire evacuation plans and instruction are posted in-hall (posted in each residential unit) and copies may be obtained through the Office of Residential Living.

Resident Advisors have fire safety training each semester. The Fire and Life Safety Office provides fire safety training to Campus Emergency Response Team (CERT) members upon request, and educates the campus community to identify safety issues and report deficiencies for corrective action. The Fire and Life Safety Office maintain a library of safety training videos for use by the university community. Contact the office (ext. 2134) for more information about available videos.

Fire drills are also conducted each semester to ensure students understand emergency building evacuation procedures. Students must evacuate the building whenever an alarm sounds. Students who ignore evacuation instruction may be subject to conduct proceedings. The Office of Residential Living schedules 4 fire drills for each housing unit, per academic year, typically 2 each semester.

Residence Hall Fire Safety Policies

There are a number of policies which address matters of health and safety in on-campus housing facilities.

Appliances and Equipment

The following appliances, including portable electrical appliances, are allowed in residence halls, provided they are in good condition and are UL approved. Authorized appliances include coffee pots, microwaves/refrigerators (university-issued only unless medical need), rice cookers, blenders, and crock pot. In Buff Hall only, residents are permitted to bring their own microwave as these are not supplied.

For health and safety reasons, the following items, including portable electrical appliances, are prohibited in residence halls. Prohibited appliances include air conditioning units including portable air conditioning systems or water coolers, camping stoves, ceiling fans, electric skillets or woks, griddles, “Insta-pot” or similar multi-cooker, deep fryers, convection cooker, “George Foreman” type grills, any halogen torchiere lamp or lamps that use halogen bulbs, potpourri pots, hot oil popcorn poppers, hot plates, oven broilers, power tools, any appliance with an open coil, space heaters, toasters or toaster ovens, or chest freezers. Extension cords of any type are not permitted in the halls. Only UL or FM rated surge protectors are permitted. The UL/FM sticker on the surge protector must note “surge protected device.” Those listed as “relocatable power taps” or otherwise are not permitted. For safety and electrical concerns, no portable heating units may be used in a residence hall. Waterbeds are not permitted in any student rooms due to safety and maintenance concerns.

Electrical appliances must be plugged directly into a wall outlet and are not permitted to be plugged into a power strip. The hall staff will confiscate unauthorized or misused appliances and the individuals responsible will be subject to disciplinary action. It is the resident’s responsibility to seek approval for any appliance in question.

Candles/Incense/Wax Warmers/Open Flames

No items with open flames, flammable fuels, or open coils may be used in any campus building including residence halls. This includes, but is not limited to candles, lanterns, heaters, and incense.

Any violation of this rule may result in immediate relocation and additional disciplinary action. Prohibited items will be immediately confiscated.

“Scentsy” or similar type products are permitted if it is UL/FM approved. Anything that burns or smolders is not permitted on campus. This includes candles and incense. This rule includes decorative candles with burned or unburned wicks. Residents found with these objects will face disciplinary action and these objects will be confiscated. Confiscated items will be disposed of at the end of each semester. Candle warmers are not allowed.

Cooking

Allowed appliances include coffee pots, microwaves/refrigerators (university-issued only unless medical need), rice cookers, blenders, and crock pot. In order to prevent unsafe conditions and limit risk to the residence halls and the WTAMU community, WTAMU residence hall personnel and safety representatives reserve the right to remove any cooking appliances deemed to be unsafe. In Buff Hall only, residents are permitted to bring their own microwave as these are not supplied.

Emergency/Safety Equipment

It is imperative that fire and safety equipment is functional and in good working order at all times. As such, the following acts are prohibited: tampering or playing with fire extinguishers, smoke detectors, exit lights, emergency lights or door and door frame fire-rating labels; tampering with or pulling a fire alarm under false pretense; removing smoke detector batteries or otherwise rendering a smoke detector inoperable; propping open fire doors; obstructing halls and stairwells with furniture, debris, or other materials; hanging objects from smoke detectors and sprinklers; loitering in fire escapes.

Residents who jeopardize the security or safety of any person will be subject to severe disciplinary action. Tampering with fire equipment or acts of arson can result in criminal prosecution, disciplinary measures, and/or possible fines. Future improvements to fire protection equipment in facilities are considered when planning for new construction or renovations.

Smoking

The WTAMU campus is a smoke-free campus. The use of tobacco products, including smokeless tobacco products (e.g. vape pens, chewing tobacco, e-cigarettes and hookahs), legal and illegal smoking products is prohibited at any university property, facility and/or state vehicle. This will include the use of these products in personal vehicles while on university property. All buildings on the WTAMU campus are tobacco free.

WTAMU is committed to supporting faculty and staff who wish to stop using tobacco and nicotine products. Residence Hall Inspection Program

The university, through a residence hall staff member or university official, reserves the right to enter a resident’s room at any time for the following purposes:

- To determine compliance with all relevant health and safety regulations. Hall staff conducts health and safety inspections in all residents' rooms a minimum of two times each semester

and notification will be posted at least 48 hours in advance of the week the health and safety inspection will take place.

- To provide cleaning and/or maintenance.
- To conduct an inventory of university property.
- If there is an indication of imminent danger to life, health, and/or property.
- Reasonable belief that a violation of rules or regulations is or has occurred.
- To search for missing property.
- To ensure that proper break period closing procedures have been followed.

Items that violate university or departmental regulations will be confiscated. Examples of items that will be confiscated include candles and unapproved appliances. WTAMU PD will be contacted to confiscate alcohol, alcohol containers, drugs, and drug paraphernalia.

The Fire and Life Safety Office also conducts annual life/safety inspections to identify safety issues and report deficiencies for corrective action. Annual inspections, functional testing and certification of residence hall fire alarm systems are performed by a licensed fire alarm company and in accordance with the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) Fire Code 72.

Residence Hall Evacuation and Emergency Procedures

The university works closely with the Texas State Fire Marshal's Office to adopt recommended fire safety measures. The Canyon Fire Department provides services to WTAMU and area residents for protection of life and property from fire and natural disasters. They maintain a standard of training which encompasses both a prompt response to emergencies and the safety of citizens.

An evacuation will occur when the fire alarm sounds and/or notification is made by WTAMU PD, the Emergency Management Team, the building emergency managers acting under the instructions of these offices or the Canyon Fire Department.

All persons (students, employees and campus visitors) are to immediately vacate the area in question, leaving by the nearest marked exit or in accordance with the posted evacuation plan and alert others to do the same. Once outside, proceed to the designated building assembly area. Personnel shall not return to an evacuated building until given the all clear signal by WTAMU PD or authorized officials.

Fire Procedures

In the event of an actual fire or a drill, all residents, guests and employees must immediately evacuate the building. Follow the instructions of Residential Living staff, CERT members, WTAMU PD Officers, and/or fire-fighting personnel. Recommended evacuation routes are posted in residence rooms and in the suites in Buff Hall. Leave the building immediately in an orderly manner and coordinate outside the building with Residential Living staff or CERT members. Keep the following items in mind in the event of a fire:

- Exit the building. Walk; don't run. Be particularly careful in staircases. Do not use elevators.
- Proceed directly to a place of safety. Do not attempt to salvage personal belongings.
- Close doors and windows when you leave.
- Before opening a closed door, feel it to see if it is hot. If it is hot, attempt to find another exit route.

- A towel or blanket soaked in water can be helpful in combating smoke inhalation.
- At all times, follow the instructions of personnel authorized to take charge at the scene of the emergency. If you have any questions about the procedures, contact your Resident Assistant immediately.
- Do not enter the building until given the all-clear by staff or fire professionals. Stand away from the building and do not block emergency vehicles; your residence hall staff will communicate the designated spot of safety during the mandatory floor meeting.

Fire alarm pull stations and fire extinguishers are installed throughout the residence halls. Building alarm systems are monitored on a 24-hour basis. When evacuating, the best way out may not be the way you came in. Have an exit strategy. <https://www.tdi.texas.gov/fire/exit-strategy.html>

Fire Doors

It is absolutely essential that corridor and stairwell doors be kept closed at all times. Closed doors retard the travel of smoke, heat, toxic gases, and fire from the area of origin. Nothing should be attached to a fire door. Residents found propping door, or tampering with fire doors or labels affixed to the door or door frame will be subject to disciplinary sanctions.

Residence Hall Evacuation Drills (Fire Drills)

The university holds fire/evacuation drills to train and familiarize the campus community on fire/evacuation procedures. All residents and guests should follow directions during the drills. Failure to evacuate the building may result in disciplinary action, a monetary fine, and possible suspension. Fire drills are scheduled throughout the year and are an important part of the WTAU fire safety program.

Fire drills are conducted in the residence halls each semester to ensure students understand emergency building evacuation procedures. Students must evacuate the building whenever an alarm sounds. Students who ignore evacuation instruction may be subject to conduct proceedings. The Office of Residential Living schedules 4 fire drills for each housing unit, per academic year, typically 2 each semester.

The purpose of the drills is to prepare building occupants for an organized evacuation in cases of an emergency. Evacuation drills are used as a way to educate and train occupants on issues specific to their facility. During the drill, occupants “practice” drill procedures and familiarize themselves with the location of exits and the sound of the fire alarm. All occupants are instructed that in cases where fire alarms are activated they must evacuate the building immediately.

The process also provides the university an opportunity to test the operation of the fire alarm system components. Any deficient equipment is noted so that appropriate repairs can be performed. Students receive emergency information and procedures during their hall meetings. Additionally, students are provided promotional materials titled “Have an Exit Strategy” which are developed by the Texas State Fire Marshal’s Office. The university continues to inspect, test and replace fire detection equipment in residential halls as necessary.

¹ Partial indicates sprinkler system only in sections of the building, and yes indicates full sprinkler system throughout entire building.

² Cousins closed May 2019 due to extensive renovations, therefore, no fire drills were conducted in calendar year 2020 or 2021.

³ Guenther Hall was not utilized as a permanent housing facility beginning in the fall 2020 semester and throughout 2021. It was utilized as temporary housing for confirmed COVID-19 residential students and did not receive fire drills during that time.

⁴ Stafford was closed for occupancy in May 2019 and demolished Fall 2019.

⁵ Fire and safety management at McCaslin Hall Apartments are provided by the privately owned management company. Instructions and tips are provided in writing to the residents at the time of leasing. Residents are prohibited from having candles, open flames, or charcoal fires in the apartment. Residents are advised to never leave hot cooking oil unattended and the stove and oven should always be in the “off” position when leaving the apartment. All smoke detectors must be in working condition and “in use” and barbeque grills should be ten (10) feet from the building. In case of fire, residents should leave the apartment immediately, call 911 and pull the handle of the red fire box (pull station) located near the apartment. Fire extinguishers are located in the laundry room. All fire systems and extinguishers are inspected annually according to state and city requirements. In 2020, fire stops were installed under vent hoods on the McCaslin Hall property to prevent kitchen/cooking fires. There are two fire extinguish canisters under every vent hood on the property to prevent kitchen/cooking fires.

Fire Safety Definitions (Department of Education)

On-campus Student Housing Facility: Any student housing facility that is owned or controlled by the institution, or is located on property that is owned or controlled by the institution, and is within the reasonably contiguous geographic area that makes up the campus is considered an on-campus student housing facility.

Cause of fire: The factor or factors that give rise to a fire. The causal factor may be, but is not limited to, the result of an intentional or unintentional action, mechanical failure, or act of nature.

Fire: Any instance of open flame or other burning in a place not intended to contain the burning or in an uncontrolled manner.

Fire drill: A supervised practice of a mandatory evacuation of a building for a fire.

Fire-related injury: Any instance in which a person is injured as a result of a fire, including an injury sustained from a natural or accidental cause, while involved in fire control, attempting rescue, or escaping from the dangers of the fire. The term “person” may include students, employees, visitors, firefighters, or any other individuals.

Fire-related death: Any instance in which a person—

- (1) Is killed as a result of a fire, including death resulting from a natural or accidental cause while involved in fire control, attempting rescue, or escaping from the dangers of a fire; or
- (2) Dies within one year of injuries sustained as a result of the fire.

Fire safety system: Any mechanism or system related to the detection of a fire, the warning resulting from a fire, or the control of a fire. This may include sprinkler systems or other fire extinguishing systems, fire detection devices, stand-alone smoke alarms, devices that alert one to the presence of a fire, such as horns, bells, or strobe lights; smoke-control and reduction mechanisms; and fire doors and walls that reduce the spread of a fire.

Value of property damage: The estimated value of the loss of the structure and contents, in terms of the cost of replacement in like kind and quantity. This estimate should include contents damaged by fire, and related damages caused by smoke, water, and overhaul; however, it does not include indirect loss, such as business interruption.

On-Campus Housing Initiatives

No plans exist for future improvements in fire safety. Future improvements to fire protection equipment in facilities are considered when planning for new construction or renovations.
